


### SAKG Program

Prep students are also learning to complete different jobs such as wiping the benches, sweeping the floors, setting the tables, and rinsing dishes.


## Congratulations Zoell

- For the UNAA ( Ultimate Ninja Athlete Association), Zoe came 25th in the world over 121 competitors ( 1 spot to the finals), and 1st in her age category for the state of Victoria.
- For the Ninja World Cup 2023, Zoe ranked 18th in the world and 1st again in her age category for the state of Victoria. WOW!! What an amazing effort...















#### The Three Cs of Cyber Safety!

On Thursday the 3<sup>rd</sup> of August, students in the 5/6 Module participated in a Cyber Safety Online Workshop, hosted by the Alannah and Madeline Foundation. They learnt that the internet is a great place where they can do wonderful things. However ... like everywhere in life ... following rules can help them keep safe. As they listened to the presentation about 'The Three Cs of Cyber Safety', students were encouraged to think about how their behaviour online affects themselves and others around them. These 'Three Cs' stand for:

- Contact: who they should/should not be interacting with online
- Conduct: how they should behave when they are online
- Content: what they should see and share when they are online

The 5/6 students now know that, if they experience anything online that they are not comfortable with, they should:

- Make sure they don't retaliate or respond
- Collect evidence about what has happened
- Report what has happened to the relevant authorities
- Change their privacy settings so it can't happen again
- Block anyone or anything that has upset them

After participating in the online workshop, students in 5/6B took off their socks and shoes (don't worry, they did it outside!) and drew around their feet so they could create visual representations of their positive 'digital footprints'. These 'digital footprints' reflect all of the ways they behave online in a positive and respectful manner.

#### Screen time for your child - 7 tips

There is a lot of conflicting advice and emerging research around screen time. But, the right amount of screen time can depend on a range of factors like your child's age and maturity, the kind of content they are consuming, their learning needs and your family routine. It can be easy to focus only on the clock and how long your child is spending in front of the screen, but the quality and nature of what they are doing online, and your involvement are just as important.

Consider your child's screen use in the context of their overall health and wellbeing - for example, is online time getting in the way of their sleep and exercise? Is it impacting on their face-to-face connections with family and friends? The answers to these questions will guide you and help strike the right balance of online and offline activities for your child.





#### 1. Be involved

Sharing screen time and online activities like gaming with your child helps you gauge the appropriateness of what they are doing and manage potential risks. It's also a great way to start conversations with your child about their online experiences.



#### 2. Work with your child to set boundaries

If you decide that setting screen time limits is right for you and your child, discuss these new rules with your child. Older children are more likely to cooperate if they have been part of the decisionmaking process. Colourful pictures or charts of daily limits and other important activities is a fun way to get younger children on board.



#### 3. Be clear about the consequences of not switching off

Part of our role as parents is to set clear limitations and boundaries. The same applies to technology limitations so, being clear and consistent about the consequences for your child if they do not stick to these rules is paramount. The Raising Children Network provides some useful tools and advice.

The Australian flag. Union Jack in the top left corner. Southern Cross constellation (Only seen from the Southern hemisphere) and the Commonwealth Star with 7 points that represents our 7 states and territories.



The Aboriginal flag. Colours are symbolic. Yellow represents the sun, the giver of life and yellow ochre. Red represents the red earth. Black represents the Aboriginal people of Australia.



The Torres Strait Islander flag. Colours and symbols represent important aspects of the life of TSI people, and their environments and culture. Green represents the land. Blue—the sea. Black—the TSI people.

The study of flags is called Vexillology. Purple is the rarest colour to be found on flags. There is only one non rectangular flag (Himalaya Mountains/Nepal). There are only 2 square flags (Switzerland and Vatican City). Flags flown upside down are a sign of distress... Or a mistake on the part of the flag monitors!!




#### How to read the student repo

A student's result is shown on an achievement scale for each assessment area. Below is an example only of the scale.

Your child's results are shown of the inside pages of this report.

The achievement scale represents increasing levels of knowledge, understanding and skills demonstrated in the assessments. Your child's results are shown by a black dot on each scale, along with:

- proficiency levels
  representing what students
  know and are able to do, at
  the time of NAPLAN testing
  (blue column)
- the national average
- the range of achievement for Year 3 students (light shaded rectangle).



Education ministers agreed that NAPLAN test results would be reported using proficiency standards from 2023 onwards. Together with the move to an earlier NAPLAN in March, these changes meet an initiative of the 2019 National School Reform Agreement. The proficiency standards are reported on reset NAPLAN measurement scales that make better use of the online adaptive tests.

Preliminary 2023 NAPLAN results will be available online

to schools in Term 3. Parents and Guardians will receive

their child's results once the Department of Education

sends them out for distribution.

#### **Scales**

NAPLAN results are reported using measurement scales for each of the assessment areas of numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation (these last 2 together called conventions of language).

#### What is the NAPLAN proficiency standard and what is assessed?

The proficiency standard for each assessment area (numeracy, reading, writing, conventions of language) is set at a challenging but reasonable expectation of learning for the student at the time of NAPLAN testing. There are 4 levels: Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support. Questions in NAPLAN tests are based mostly on the literacy and numeracy skills students have been taught in previous years of schooling. *In* 2022, these proficiency standards were assessed in bands between 1-8.

#### **Proficiency standards**

The NAPLAN proficiency standards include 4 proficiency levels for each assessment area at each year level:

**Exceeding:** the student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing. **Strong:** the student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.

**Developing:** the student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.

**Needs additional support:** the student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing.

Questions in NAPLAN are based mostly on the literacy and numeracy knowledge and skills students have learnt from previous years of schooling. A few questions assess additional content from the year of testing and the following year. These questions have been designed so that they can be answered using strategies students have learnt in previous years. This ensures students of all abilities can show their capabilities.

#### How to read the student report



A student's result is shown on an achievement scale for each assessment area. Results across the Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 literacy and numeracy assessments are reported on a scale from Band 1 to Band 10.

The achievement scale represents increasing levels of knowledge, understanding and skills demonstrated in the assessments. Results for Year 5 are reported across the range of Band 3 to Band 8, with Band 4 representing the national minimum standard for this year level.

The national average and the range of achievement for Year 5 students are also shown on the scale.
