
Maths Games Day 2023



Student wellbeing - benefits of walking/riding to and from school



- higher academic performance in terms of attention/alertness, verbal, numeric, and reasoning abilities.
- ✓ higher degree of pleasantness and lower levels of stress during the school day.
- ✓ higher levels of happiness, excitement, and relaxation on the journey to school.
- ✓ increased personal growth by developing a sense of independent decision making, emotional bonds with peers and the natural environment, and road and traffic safety skills.
- more physical activity which comes with increased metabolism, improved cardiorespiratory fitness, and lower weight and BMI.
